

Course Checklist — Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel

The Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel, which is administered by the College of Arts and Letters, is available to students enrolled in a bachelor's degree program at Michigan State University. With approval by the department and college that administer the student's degree program, the courses used to satisfy the requirements for the Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel may also be used to satisfy the requirements for the bachelor's degree. The Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel introduces students to the history, religion, culture, and civilization of the Jewish people from biblical times to the present, with special focus on Jews in Europe, North America, and the Middle East in the modern era.

Requirements for the Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel: The student must complete a minimum of 18 credits from the courses listed below or other acceptable courses. A maximum of twelve (12) Hebrew credits can be taken towards the minor. Students enrolled in summer semester, academic semester, or year-long MSU study in Israel programs can use courses abroad to qualify. Transfer courses from other universities in the US, Israel, or elsewhere may also be acceptable. Courses marked with an asterisk (*) may count if they have sufficient Jewish Studies and Modern Israel content. Please check with the Director of the Michael and Elaine Serling Institute for Jewish Studies and Modern Israel (Dr. Yael Aronoff; aronoffy@msu.edu) whether courses offered in a particular semester or transfer courses meet the requirements for inclusion. The certification of completion of the Minor in Jewish Studies and Modern Israel appears on the student's official academic transcript.
