An ambitious young journalist, Yarden, is put to the test when her boss (who also happens to be her lover) assigns her to do a story about blind dating in hopes of chasing ratings. She convinces her best friend to go out on a daily date for a month, each evening with a different woman, until he finds the right one. Even cynical young millennials believe in true love, right? Yarden's not so sure. One More Story is the directorial debut from Israel's beloved comedian and TV personality, Guri Alfi, and was based on Omer Barak's bestseller, Wedding Pressure, which received the highest price ever paid for movie rights in Israel. With a great score, the film is a fun-filled ride as we share the journey of Yarden's complicated dating history while waiting to discover if true love is to be found. Romantic comedy, Israeli style!

Omer Barak is an Israeli writer, scriptwriter and journalist. He has written for Israeli magazines such as Globes, 7 days, and Blazer. His debut book, Wedding Pressure, was a number one bestseller in 2017, and broke Israeli selling records. In 2021, along with Alfi Guri, Barak adapted Wedding Pressure into the film One More Story. Barak's second book, Everybody Smile, just came out in December 2022 and hit the number one bestselling list within six hours!

Shoshana Damari was born in 1923 in Yemen to a Jewish family, the youngest in a family of five siblings. In 1925, after a grueling trek on foot, the Damaris reached to port of Aden where she took a ship to Palestine and and moved to her childhood home in Rishon Lezion. Throughout her life, Shoshana Damari was surrounded by fans. The first Israeli diva, cloaked in spectacular embroidered gowns, donning an abundance of jewels, she graced local and international stages and stirred millions with her husky and beguiling voice. She was the most successful export of Israel to the outside world. In the years she lived in the United States, she was a friend of Danny Kaye, Nat King Cole, Nina Simon and Harry Belafonte who also recorded one of her songs.

Yet behind the "bigger than life" image there was a woman about whom we know little. She didn't like to be interviewed and never volunteered details about her private ife, her opinions or her thoughts.

In this film we will attempt to depict the other Shoshana. Letters and diaries, rare archive material from her estate and interviews with her most inner circle, will shed light on the fascinating story of the undisputed "Queen of Hebrew Music," a gueen who in her twilight years was forgotten and left without a kingdom.



She is currently a resident of Jerusalem, where she volunteers at the Jerusalem African Community Center in their human rights department working with asylum seekers from Eritrea and Sudan. Ruchama is currently working at The Feuerstein Institute as the Resource Development Coordinator and getting her masters in Human Rights Practice from the University of Arizona.

The story of the late Aharon Katzir, a pioneer in the study of the electrochemistry of biopolymers. He received the Israel Prize in 1961 and was president of the Israel Academy of Arts and Sciences, 1962-1968.

He was killed by a Japanese terrorist at Lod (Ben-Gurion) airpoin 1972.

Dr. Yael Katzir, is an accomplished and award-winning Israeli documentary filmmaker, former head of the History Department and lecturer at the Film Department in the Art School of Beit Berl Academic College. Her films include *Company Jasmine*, *Praying In Her Own Voice, Violins in Wartime, Shores of Light, The Albanian Code, Shiva for My Mother* and *My Grandma Had a Gun*.

Dr. Katzir, Serling Visiting Israeli Scholar in 2012, 2017, and 2021, taught a crosslisted class for English, James Madison College, and the Film Studies Program: "From Collective Identity to Personal Diversity: Israeli Documentary Filmmaking"
